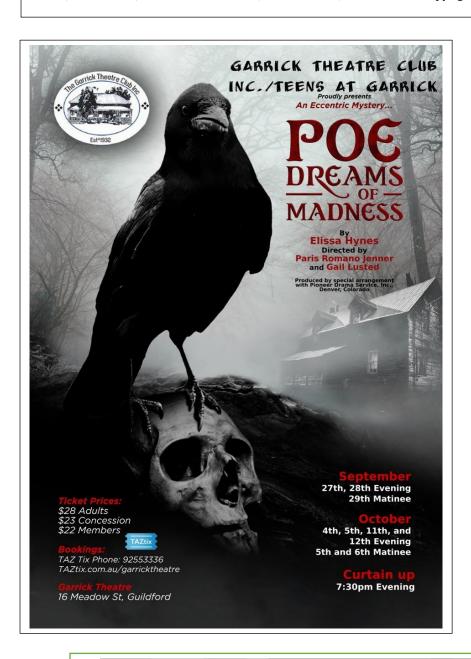

### Pygmalion - Reviewed by Kate O'Sullivan

110 years on from its first performances, Garrick Theatre's current production is Pygmalion. Whilst perhaps more well-known in the musical form of My Fair Lady, the plot is very much the same here, looking at class and social mobility through the lens of language.

The performances are the highlight of this version of this production. Peter Clark brings a wonderfully dislikeable Henry Higgins, with some lovely variance across the show. Catherine Leeson is every moment the Eliza we want with well-crafted accent work and stage presence. All three of the Eynsford-Hills are also played well, with nicely true-feeling relationships between all three. For some of the other characters, the accents tended to wander a touch, especially in a show that is so dedicated to language and the power of phonetics

It's always a challenge when mounting a show that is so well known. This production does a good job of fulfilling the audience's expectations, while also feeling like its own version. There are some moments where some of the blocking feels a little arbitrary and stilted, but this is more down to the stage size making some of the larger movements feel abrupt rather than sweeping. The first half suffers the most for this, as we want to feel the movement of both Eliza and Alfred in full flight as their lower-class selves. Additionally, some characters end up upstaging themselves, making it harder for them to be understood by the older members of the audience.

The set is well crafted, using the revolve well to quickly switch us between Covent Garden, Wimpole Street and Mrs Higgins's abode. The scene changes are as swift as you could ask, and where the sets are simple, the use of clever lighting to change both wall colours and to add atmosphere in the initial scene works wonderfully. The costumes for this production set the tone well, especially for the women. It would have been nice to see similar care and details in the men's costumes, but the dresses, especially those for Mrs Higgin's 'at home' day are a triumph.

All in all, a solid take on a classic piece of theatre. With new faces and old hands sharing the stage, it's well worth the trip out to Guildford.

#### **Kimberley Shaw – Stage Whispers**

Classic plays are held in esteem for a reason, and it is always a pleasure to see a well performed classic play hit our local stages. Garrick's production of George Bernard Pygmalion is a five act play featuring three quite different settings, and clever design from director Fred Petersen allows this to happen on the pocket-sized Garrick stage. Although sets are simple rather than grandiose or opulent, they serve the show well. As a period-piece, costumes are important, and the women's costumes in this production are excellent. Great work from Carly Ranger, Maggie Adam, and Janice Phillips. Costume fans would be happy to pay the price of admission to admire Eliza's boots alone. Geoff Holt is responsible for both lights and sound, creating an impressive rainstorm in Act One.

Catherine Leeson makes a superb Australian and Community Theatre debut as Eliza Doolittle, in her first performance as an adult. An Irish doctor, recently arrived in Australia, we see no trace of Irish accent as we journey through Eliza's journey from cockney flower girl to duchess quality English. A beautifully acted performance.

Peter Clark makes a welcome return to the stage, after a five-year hiatus, inhabiting the prickly, lacking in manners Henry Higgins with conviction, in a likeably unlikeable performance. Stuart Ridgeway is a worthy partner-in-crime as the more mannerly and gentlemanly Colonel Pickering.

Marsha Holt has a wonderful combination of authority and compassion as Mrs Higgins, although I felt more thought needed to be given to accent. In the other parental role, Adam Skelton was given a difficult task, being forced to play upstage for much of his first appearance as Alfred Doolittle – but he came into his own as reluctant member of the middle-class later in the show.

Jan Phillips plays Mrs Eynsford-Hill with quiet sophistication and considerable depth. Daughter Clara is played by Sorcha Leary, another young Irish doctor making an excellent Australian debut. James Skellham takes on the difficult role of Freddy – as is appropriately understated.

Allyson Corti returns to the stage after a nearly twenty-year absence, noticeably growing in confidence on opening night, as Mrs Pearce, while Juliette Hyland, yet another recent arrival from Ireland, in her first Australian appearance, is particularly impressive as the Parlour Maid, giving this young woman a distinct personality. #### Stage Whispers - Kimberley Shaw

Steel Magnolias, Robert Harling's dramatic tribute to the strength of women in the Southern United States, is somewhat of a modern classic. Garrick Theatre's latest production is a warm, feel-good production, with a lovely ensemble cast.

Ali McNamara's set design nicely evokes Truvy's enclosed garage beauty parlour, the site of all the action over a two-and-a-half-year period during the 1980s, supported by sympathetic sound and lighting by Geoff Holt. Costumes by Carly Ranger, Maggie Adams and cast are generally very good, sympathetic to both character and era, although I questioned the choice to have Osier's first appearance be in a "nice dress" when so much can be said about Ouiser with costume.

Lea McCall, in what I believe is her first appearance in Perth, has a long history with this play having played Clairee in Albany and directing the show in Northam. A great sense of control and ownership of the space, she was a delight to watch, with outstanding non-verbals. Her assistant, new-to-town Annelle, was sweetly played by Allison Sermon, giving her character a lovely arc.

Catalyst character Shelby Eatonton-Latcherie was superbly played by Grainne Kennedy - another sign that young Irish doctors are not only a boon to our health system but are making a great impact on our community theatre scene - especially at Garrick - a superb and beautifully acted performance. Sally Forbes played her mother M'Lynn, doing particularly well with M'Lynn's tragic monologue.

Heather Marshall was elegant and sincere as widowed Claire Belcher, while Kylie Calwell stole scenes with her loveably rough-as-guts interpretation of Ouiser.

While the action ran fairly smoothly on stage, the scene changes were a little laborious. The radio announcements should bridge and cover the scene changes, rather than start the scene.

Always a fun show. *Steel Magnolias* runs for one final weekend.

#### Theatre Reviews Perth - Jordan D'Arcy

Steel Magnolias is a classic play, written by Robert Harling, about six women who catch up each day by visiting the local salon owned by one of their own, Truvy Jone. It's a very slice-of-life piece and jumps months at a time between scenes to progress the plot....

...Director Lynne Devenish has done a wonderful job of assembling a really coherent and smooth production. Steel Magnolias is set in a small Southern American country town, and Lynne's cast pulled off the task of committing to the Southern drawl with consistency.

Lea McCall as Truvy had an engaging stage presence and was every bit the wise, if somewhat simple at times, salon owner. Kylie Calwell as Ouiser was an audience favourite, with excellent comedic timing. Heather Marshall was sweet as Clairee. Sally Forbes and Grainne Kennedy, as M'Lynn and Shelby respectively, created a believable mother-and-daughter dynamic. Both had significant heavy plot points revolving around their characters and skillfully handled the deeply emotive scenes they were tasked with. Allison Sermon was a beautiful contrast to the rest of the cast with her portrayal of the soft and naïve Annelle.

Acting while you're speaking is one thing but remembering to stay in character whilst you're not directly engaged in the dialogue is another. One thing this cast did really well is that they often had significant portions of scenes where they were listening to the salon goings on and not contributing dialogue but still totally engaged in what was happening, which had me feeling like I was there with them in the room.

The costumes (a group effort by Carly Ranger, Maggie Adams, and the cast) overall were excellent. There were a couple of clothing pieces that blended into the set and made the actors hard to see for that scene, but otherwise, costumes and hair were very good. In particular, the 80s-style hairdos that are important to this show particularly were done excellently.

The set was beautiful – very clearly a hair salon, very clearly 1980s. There were a couple of instances where set and/or props felt underused. An example is the mirror on the wall at the haircut station, which was only used maybe twice, as the rest of the time the fourth wall was used as the mirror. Steel Magnolias was an enjoyable production, and the team should be proud of themselves. It is definitely one of the best productions I've seen on the Garrick stage.
